Principal's Report

Resilience is Key

As we have moved into, then away from the three quarter mark of the term I am reminded of how much resilience and grit is needed for students to positively interact with each other. Sometimes, it's tough a gig being a kid but they aren't alone. They have a wonderful network of loving families and dedicated school staff to support them through challenges.

When our bodies and minds become fatigued, often our resilience goes down. This triggers a range of issues, from a reduced focus in the classroom to friendship fires in the playground. Our students, like all other kids, struggle at times when resilience is low but it is in these times they learn, with guidance and care, how to cope with difficult situations.

Recently, I listened to a psychologist speaking about anxiety and he said that I in 3 teenagers experience anxiety at some stage. Unsurprisingly, he stated that it is the significant adults in a child's life that play the most important role in shaping kids. That's us! Families and Staff. He detailed his ideas of why this happens and what he thought was the key to improving these statistics it is **resilience building**.

We all need to be acutely aware of how we deal with negative incidents. At school, we are learning about the different emotions and learning to acknowledge them. We are building strategies for dealing with ours and others' emotions and actions. We embrace mistakes and support all students to learn from them, no matter how big or small. We are helping students build a bank of strategies to help them cope with 'Normal Life Challenges'. This will enable them to deal with future difficult situations because we all go through them from time to time.




Tech Groups

We have been using borrowed kits to explore different technologies.

Home I have been learning about coding. They built a Lego hopper and then coded it to move. They were very keen to have a race! They have also been coding a Microbit to create a light up dice.

Home 2 have been investigating film making. They used green screen techniques, as well as shooting videos with stands to make the filming more stable. Some of the seniors had the opportunity to investigate Mirobits and created a transporting Duck. They coded the image of a duck and then used radiowaves to transport it to another device.









Science

Students have been learning about investigations, experiments and asking scientific questions.

Home I are learning about reactions and materials. They have investigated how some household substances react when they are mixed. They also explored what everyday items are made from and learnt about which can be recycled. They created a set of binoculars and went on a bird watching expedition. Home 2 are exploring how things are made. We have been looking at Dr Karl Kruszelnicki's ABC series "How Things Work". We have learnt how chocolate is made and that the colour of red snakes is made from crushed cochineal beetles!


